#### Introduction

- When a spill occurs the spiller is required to take prompt action to contain, control, notify, clean up and restore the environment
  - · Often use spill cleanup contractors
- Municipalities often provide the initial response to a spill or related emergency
  - · Especially if local roads or watercourses are impacted
- MOE responds to spills on a 24/7 basis and works closely with other agencies including:
  - Municipalities, Emergency Management Ontario, Environment Canada, the Canadian Coast Guard, and US authorities for trans-boundary incidents

# Ontario's Spill Legislation Part X EP Act



### **Ontario's Spill Legislation**

- Key provisions in Part X of the Environmental Protection Act:
  - Duty to report
  - Duty to clean up and restore
  - Municipal Response
  - Minister Orders or Directions
  - Compensation

### Duty to Report (Sect 92)

- · Person having control of pollutant and
- · Person who spills, causes or permits a spill
- Must report spills forthwith to the Ministry
  - The Spills Action Centre 24/7

### Duty to Clean Up (Sect. 93)

Owner of pollutant and Person having control

#### Must clean-up and restore

- This is an absolute responsibility

### Municipal Response (Sect. 100)

- Municipality given the right to respond
- Provided with rights of entry and immunity from prosecution
- Required to co-operate with others
- Provided with rights to compensation
- Municipality can issue an order to the owner or person in control to recover costs and expenses (sub-section 101.1)

### Minister's Direction (Section 94)

- Empowers the Minister to Direct:
  - MOE Staff
  - Agents of the Ministry

#### To respond to spills if responsible parties:

- Default
- Are not known
- Request assistance

### Minister's Order (Section 94)

- Empowers Minister to order:
  - · Those with a duty,
  - Owners of affected property, municipalities,
  - · Other public authorities,
  - Any person who may be affected by spill or whose assistance is necessary....

### Compensation (Section 99)

- The Crown or any other person has right to compensation from owner / person in control
  - · For loss or damage
  - · For reasonable cost and expense
  - This includes costs and expenses incurred in responding to a Minister's Direction or Order

### **Spills Action Centre**

- SAC operates a 24-hour provincial service for receiving and coordinating responses to reports of spills and other environmental matters
- SAC also receives reports on behalf of a number of other agencies
  - Ministries of Labour and Health, Technical Standards and Safety Authority and Environment Canada

### **Spills Action Centre**

- Receive reports (24 hours/day)
- Evaluate incidents
- Initiate and coordinate response
- Liase with other agencies
- Provide information
- Warn affected parties
  - e.g. spills to St. Clair River contact water treatment plants, health agencies and US authorities

### **Regional Support**

- Regional offices can be called upon to provide technical advice, procedural guidance and management support
- They can provide varying degrees of sampling, modeling and monitoring support.

### **Drinking Water Support**

- The Drinking Water Management Division has well trained drinking water inspectors and supervisors across the Province
- They can be called in to assist when spills or related emergencies threaten drinking water supplies

### **Scientific Support**

- The Environmental Science and Standards Division can provide a range of valuable support services
  - Air and water modeling experts who can help predict environmental impacts
  - Laboratory testing facilities that can test for a wide range of contaminants
  - Mobile Trace Atmospheric Gas Analyzer (TAGA) units that can provide emergency air monitoring
  - A Great Lakes monitoring vessel





# ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

Ontario

### **Spiller – Owner or Controller**

- Absolute responsibility for spill cleanup and restoration (Section 93 EP Act)
- Expected to stop leak, contain, clean up, restore and compensate those affected
- Given right to enter property and take necessary steps to meet their cleanup responsibilities

### **Municipalities**

- Part X EP Act provides municipalities with:
  - authority to respond to spills
  - rights of entry
  - protection from prosecution
  - rights to compensation from owner/ controller
    - Cost recovery



### **Municipalities**

- Normally provide containment and cleanup measures for fuel and oil spills
- Fire departments / public works often deal with minor fuel and oil spills and some dangerous goods spills
- Municipal authorities have primary responsibility for public health and safety

### **Ministry of the Environment**

- As the lead regulatory agency MOE:
  - Determines nature and extent of environmental damage
  - Recommends response procedures
  - Evaluates containment, cleanup and disposal
  - Initiates cleanup procedures when required
  - · Enforces legislated responsibilities
  - Recommends spill prevention measures
  - Documents all findings, actions and recommendations

### **MOE Cleanup Expectations**

- To the extent practicable the owner / controller is expected to clean up and restore the environment to the condition it was before the spill occurred
  - Do everything practicable to prevent, eliminate and ameliorate adverse effects and to restore the environment to pre-spill conditions
  - When pre-spill conditions are not known MOE's Brownfield Standards are sometimes used as a default reference
  - Determination is made on a case by case basis
